
Good morning everyone,

With the clocks due to go back next weekend, we are entering that twilight period of the year when the daylight hours are fewer in number, but don't completely confine us. The autumn colours around the gardens and the countryside are just about at their best, though looking up the Blane Valley from Ardinning earlier this week, it will be a couple more weeks before the trees really display their final flourish of the year. We had a splendid talk from Syd House at the beginning of this month, in which he extolled the beauty of the Perthshire countryside in autumn, but there is plenty of colour around Milngavie, Bearsden and Baldernock in the woods and gardens, Doing my daily Covid walk around the local streets. I am seeing plenty of beautiful acers with colours so bright the dark glasses are almost required. As to Crossburn and its surrounds, the hues of autumn are on full display and with the recent stillness of the wind, it is a very peaceful and restful scene, unless you are trying to sweep up endless piles of leaves! Bulb planting for the spring is ongoing; division of plants is heavy work, especially in my soil and the moving of pots and containers is all part of the preparation for winter and the coming spring. The birds are back feeding like fury on the feeders, but too many magpies as always seems to be the case at this time of year. A buzzard was sitting on the fence at the back of the garden this morning, but wouldn't wait for his picture to be taken, which was pretty rude. When we bought Crossburn 36 years ago, there was one tree on our land. It was a relatively small Rowan, which grew as the years passed, but this year, sadly, it died and has had to be cut down and has altered the view up the long border. The stump has been retained and the plan is to allow clematis, perhaps, to climb and roam over it. The birds have adapted to the loss of many perches.

I have received quite a bit of correspondence which requires to be forwarded to you all, plus we have had a Zoom Committee Meeting and some decisions from that need to be announced, so you now need to concentrate. As mentioned above, Syd House gave us a fascinating talk on the Reforestation of Scotland, which I found to be very informative and quite inspiring. His enthusiasm is pretty infectious so I reckon his talk **On Creating Holm Farm Gardens** will be full of boundless Zoom energy.
