## Good morning all,

After four weeks without rain, a small amount has fallen to, at the very least, slightly moisten the ground. It has been great for the roses which are blooming with enthusiasm. I have a white climbing rose that is really enjoying this dry summer as it has been able to bloom brilliantly and to release its scent to delicious effect. Tomorrow is the Summer Solstice and it has to be hoped that the gardens will continue to flourish for the rest of the summer and that we all get time to enjoy being in them, perhaps accompanied by a glass of cool Rose.
