## Baldernock Gardening Club: December 2023 Newsletter: It is not exactly digging weather these days.

Good evening one and all,

The Scandinavians have invaded us once again, but this time not in long-boats; instead they have sent us very chilly weather. To say it is Baltic is in fact true, though I suspect it may be even colder there at the moment. (I have just looked it up and I think we are having a heatwave in comparison.) When the skies are clear and the sun is shining, the garden does not have that awful bedraggled look. The frost enhances some of the plants, stems and remaining seed heads and in the early morning the whole place glistens. The hellebores behave like Collies in the cold by lying flat on the ground, whilst the red stems of the cornus flaunt their winter colour. Just about everything else is cooried doon for the winter. Fortunately, I have managed to get all my bulbs planted in the ground and in pots. Those pots requiring their thermal overwear have been suitably clothed and the tree fern has had its root trunk fleeced and its crown stuffed with oak leaves (recommended I read) and straw. All the pots with bulbs have had netting put over their tops to stop the squirrels, mice, unless they sneak up the drainage hole, and deer feasting on juicy tulip bulbs. I didn't cover one well enough as I had run out of suitable netting and in the morning several bulbs were missing and a lot of earth was spread around the tub; the air turned blue. As to wild life, there is not much to report, except that the pink footed geese squadrons continue to fly overhead every evening around 4:30/5.00 and then take the return journey the following morning around 8.00. The RSPB App describes their call as "an incessant and rather musical 'wink, wink' " It is incessant, it is very loud, but I cannot describe it as in any way musical; it is a bit like a large choir of me singing and that is not a melodic sound. The geese apparently arrived in Scotland at the end of October from Greenland and Iceland, with a return ticket for April. They are using the water-filled old quarry workings in Douglasmuir Quarry as their nighttime roost.

As all Members know, the **Annual Christmas Party (Members only)** is our next event on the calendar. The Committee have been beavering away trying to simplify all their brain exercising questions for the **Ridiculously Easy Quiz (REQ)** and to gather all the food and wine, both alcohol free and alcohol influenced, to help you all to enjoy the evening.
