Baldernock Gardening Club: August 2023 Newsletter: Wild and woolly gardens

Good afternoon everyone,

Welcome back to the world of the BGC after a couple of months of relative silence. I am hopeful you have all had a good summer in your gardens and, if you went abroad, you did not become over cooked. After the middle of June, there wasn't much chance of being over cooked in Milngavie as the jetstream ensured we had the rain other countries were praying for. It does seem a long time ago, almost two months past since the Club's Summer Social, when we were enjoying the warm sunshine, the balmy, midge free evenings, the profusion of rose blooms and the wish that the warmth would continue right through the summer. We forget, always, that the weather breaks as soon as the school holidays start; unfortunately, there is no counter contrariness when the schools return!

At the Summer Social, we enjoyed an almost perfect evening of weather and, I may be biased here, but both gardens at Crossburn were looking in pretty good nick for the occasion. Since then the increasing alarm warnings of water shortages caused by six weeks of no rain, have somewhat abated. The rain and the damp has certainly not abated. The garden here has had a good summer, so maybe the early summer heat followed by plenty of moisture, has been beneficial. The clematis on the eight stride arch have been spectacular and long lasting, thanks, in part, to a daily routine of dead-heading. Similarly, the salvia, which this year I planted in pots rather than in the ground, have actually survived and have given a wonderful display. For years I have had no success with salvia, of any variety or colour, so from now onwards it will be salvia in pots. For many years, too, I have grown my sweet peas up through cane wigwams and they produced short and twisted stemmed flowers, but this year I Heath Robinson-ed a free standing trellis and the effect has been remarkable (the trellis managed to stay up!). We have been collecting huge, long stemmed bunches daily for the past few weeks and they are still coming. The scent has been wonderful. The dahlias are doing well; in fact, as Joe Swift reported recently in the Times, the garden is looking decidedly wild and woolly with plenty of colour and over full beds, which seems to have even put off the deer as there is too much choice. The deer have visited over recent days, but they have concentrated their diet on the fallen apples, which has saved me from picking them up from the "lawn". Talking of apples, it does look as though we will have a good crop this year, which in turn means plenty of stewed-apple for the morning porridge. All the vegetables have done well, except for the garlic which has been pretty disastrous. So all in all, apart from battling against the persistent growth of weeds (sticky willow has been a particularly invasive nuisance), it has been a good summer in the garden. As each summer passes and the human body creaks a bit more, some tasks do take longer to accomplish and the requirement for increased tea drinking, accompanied by a seat, becomes more welcome and necessary.

Now I must move onto Club business, which is really what this Newsletter should be concentrating upon. Our first meeting of the new season is **Wednesday 13th September at 19:30 in Baljaffray Parish Church** and our speaker will be **Melissa Simpson, Head Gardener at Dumfries House**. At the time of writing, I am still awaiting details from Melissa, which I will advise you of prior to the meeting. Then on **Wednesday 11th October** our speaker will be **Andy MacGregor**, a Bearsden native, who is a member of the British Pteridological Society and has appeared on Gardeners' World, will be taking us into the wonderful world of ferns. By the time of our first meeting, I am still hoping the sound system at the Church will have been renewed, but like anything that affects disparate interests, progress is never quite as quick as one would wish for, so just keep your non-gardening fingers crossed.
